This decision has sparked large-scale protests from Guangzhou citizens, who believed it would weaken the use of Cantonese in the public sphere and threaten Guangdong's local cultural identity. The organizers of the protest used Cantonese songs as a cultural symbol to express their dissatisfaction with the policy, emphasizing the value of Cantonese as an important component of Lingnan culture. However, this also reveals the contradiction between local cultural protection and national policies that may arise when local governments promote national language policies. Although the national policy aims to strengthen the promotion of Mandarin, the status of Cantonese is still very important in a multicultural region like Guangdong, which creates complex challenges to policy implementation.

In short, the cultural localization process of Cantonese pop music in China is not only a change in music style, but also a complex cultural and political interaction. Through this musical form, Cantonese pop music has become an important carrier for expressing cultural identity, social concerns, and political views, reflecting its unique position and influence in contemporary Chinese society and culture.
